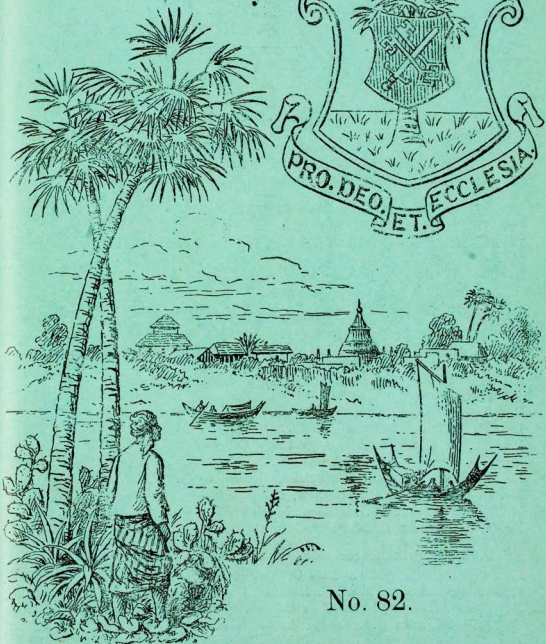
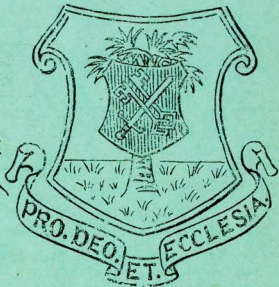

We hope that all our friends in and near London will make a special effort to be present to hear the Bishop's report of work. In view of the restrictions, we cannot expect friends from a distance. (It was suggested at the Committee Meeting that perhaps they might send up the amount of the railway fare they would have paid.)

THE BISHOP'S LETTERS.

As from S.P.G. HOME, S.W.

April 5th, 1917.

Dear Mr. Cooke,

This is a time for surprises, and I can only hope that my own and my wife's sudden arrival among our friends in England is a less disagreeable sort of surprise than the dropping of a bomb from a "Zep."

The explanation of our sudden arrival is that I got a bad swelling on my jaw before Christmas. Fever developed. The dentist pulled out some teeth, but that did not cure it, and eventually our kind and capable civil surgeon in Rangoon operated on me, and I had a month in the Rangoon Hospital getting well. When I had got about again the surgeon told me I had better get home at once instead of waiting till a month later as I had intended to do, so we packed up as soon as possible, after I had paid necessary visits to the Karens in the hills near Toungoo, and those in the Delta, and came away by the first boat we could get. It was only these last visits that prevented us embarking on the *Worcestershire* which was sunk by a mine near Columbo. As it was, we came by Calcutta and Bombay, and then by P. and O. steamer. At Calcutta, the mails were delayed for a day which we spent with the Metropolitan, and I was glad of the opportunity of a talk with him. At Bombay also, we had three days to wait for our steamer which came from Australia. These days we spent enjoying the kind hospitality of the Bishop of Bombay and Mrs. Palmer. Of the voyage I must not say more than that we narrowly escaped a torpedo, and then had half-an-hour's fight with the submarine that sent it at us, in which neither of us managed to hit the other. Eventually, in skirting the coast, we touched an outlying rock and had to go into an Italian harbour. From there we were sent on by train. As the voyage was not without its dangers, we decided to give our friends no warning of our coming, and only presented ourselves when the dangers were all safely past.

I am sorry to say I shall not be able this time to run about as much as I did the last time I was at home. Railway travelling is not encouraged and is very expensive, besides which I have come home by the doctor's orders and must keep quiet for a time. I think, however, that the secret of my swollen face has been discovered, and that I shall not have further trouble with it.

I desire through the medium of the R.D.A. Quarterly to greet all friends of the Diocese in England most cordially, and I hope to meet as many of them as possible at the Annual Meeting on June 20th. Wherever it is possible for me to do so, I hope also to meet the Diocesan secretaries and others interested in our work in the various localities I am able to visit.

England has hitherto provided a cold welcome, so far (but only so far) as weather is concerned. We hope, however, that that is only the prelude to a glorious summer. Even if it is not, the air is English air and full of vivifying properties for those who get back from the tropics for a time: the spiritual atmosphere also is Christian; and only those who live in a country that is mainly heathen know what a difference that makes to the joy of life.

I am not attempting to give news of those we have left behind in Burma, in this letter. I shall have more to say of that at the Annual Meeting. I hope also that Mr. W. Purser, Mr. Menzies, and Miss Colbatch Clark who are all in England, may be able to be present. I am sorry that Bishop Knight cannot be with us this year as he is to go to France for some months to work for our soldiers. We shall miss him more than we can say. But the soldiers and sailors have the first claim at present, and we must grudge them nothing. I only hope that this long and cruel war may soon, by God's goodness, be brought to an end. Then, when the horrible night-mare is past, we can awaken again to new vigour in our work.

Extracts from a Letter to Bishop Knight.

HOSPITAL, RANGOON,

Jan. 15th, 1917.

..... My outing this morning was to Government House to ask the Lieutenant Governor to make up our lost Grants to Schools, and not to reduce the Grants for the future. We had a formal meeting of the Lieutenant Governor, the Revenue Secretary, Secretary of Government D.P.I., the Head of the Baptist College, a Representative of the Roman Catholics, and myself. I had previously sent in a statement of our case. The Lt. Gov. had a

written statement ready in reply, in which he, with the assent of the Revenue Secretary, gave us back the whole of the lost grants, and appointed the D.P.I., the Revenue Secretary, and myself to consider whether the grants for the future could be maintained as before. So we have done very well.

Eurasian Orphanage at Moulmein—Kinch came over to Rangoon and collected some Rs. 8,000, and Ellaby has since sent me Rs. 1,000 for the Orphanage, so I think we shall get through this year all right.

Motor Launch—I am delighted that there has been such a response to the appeal. I believe the estimate and plans are all ready here. We can get a good boat built locally, and bring out a thoroughly good engine for her from England, i.e., if war circumstances allow. I believe it will help the Kemmendine work greatly. This sickness has made me lose a Karen tour with Fisher. I am very sorry. I hope to go with Blyth Feb. 1—20.

NEWS FROM THE FRONT.

Dr. Percy Dearmer has been spending Lent and Easter in the Diocese. This is in connection with Y.M.C.A. work, but no doubt he will have done some other work besides during his stay.

* * * *

On S. Thomas' Day, December 21st, Vadivaloo Gnana-prakasam was ordained to the Diaconate in the Cathedral. He was converted from heathenism some years ago in Moulmein, where he was working in a lawyer's office, and he has stood firmly against a good deal of opposition and quiet persecution. His firmness and whole-hearted devotion led to his being appointed as a catechist to minister to the Tamil congregation at Moulmein. In that capacity he won the approval both of the congregation and the priest in charge of S. Augustine's, the Rev. D. C. Atwood, and they united in asking that he might be ordained. He succeeded in satisfying the Examining Chaplains; so, after two days quiet thought and prayer at Bishops court, he was ordained; and has returned to work at Moulmein.

Miss Elliott writes to Miss Knight—. I do wish you could pay us a flying visit so that we could show you S. Mary's

re-built. You would appreciate our nice light and airy rooms, such a contrast to the old ones. The terrace is a joy, for there we can get a blow of fresh air, and not have to go out for it.

The children have such a lovely dormitory at the top of the house, with sixteen windows in it, and each girl has her own locker. Then the basement is all play-ground which is such a boon, and so delightfully cool. We have much cause to be thankful that we were able to build it before the war.

MISSION OF THE RESURRECTION, SYRIAM.

This Mission started its work in 1909. Previous to that occasional visits to Syriam had been paid by the Missionary in charge of S. Barnabas Mission, Rangoon, the Rev. E. H. Cox, who is still responsible for the work of the two Missions, and now spends part of his time in Syriam, and part in Rangoon.

The first Mission Building is now used for the Vernacular School. The first Church (a mat building) was erected in 1910, but collapsed in a storm in 1911, when the present church was erected of stouter material. An effort is now being made to raise money for a permanent church on an acre of land given for the purpose by Government.

During the years 1909—1916, all the villages close to Syriam have been visited constantly, and preaching has been done from house to house, and by means of lantern pictures. Villages further afield have also been visited often. At one time there were two Catechists working with the Missionary, one in Syriam, and one in the District. At present there is only one.

The Mission has also provided Spiritual Ministration for the European population. A regular Sunday Evening Service, a Monthly Celebration on Sunday, and a weekly on Wednesday, have been provided.

In March, 1912, S. George's European School was opened. It has now an average attendance of twenty-eight, and supplies a real need. It works up to Standard IV.

S. George's Vernacular School was opened in August 1910, as an Anglo-Vernacular Institution, but in 1914 its status was altered.

It has between fifty and sixty scholars, and a small Boarding Establishment, with at present five boarders, two of whom attend the European School, two the Vernacular, and one the Methodist School.

After three years absence the Rev. G. Whitehead has returned to work in the Diocese. He has come in response largely to the call to Car Nicobar. The Rev. H. L. Clarke, who has been in charge there for two years, has reached the end of the five years for which he came to the Diocese. He had a bad bout of ill health after residing in the island for some time alone, and that made it impossible for him to do more than visit the island from Port Blair, where he has lately been acting as Chaplain. He must leave for England before long.

Mr. Whitehead arrived on Jan. 11th, and spent some time in visiting the Chin Mission, and the Burmese Missions in the Kemmendine district. We hope that by now he will have arrived at Car Nicobar.

* *

On Jan. 4th, the Ven. Archdeacon Cory completed his twenty-five years service under the Indian Government, and finally retired.

He is followed in the Office of Archdeacon by the Rev. H. W. Blandford, who has been Acting Archdeacon for the two years over which Archdeacon Cory's final furlough extended. In ordinary circumstances Archdeacon Blandford would have left Burma early last year. But owing to the shortage of Chaplains he has stayed on, and now undertakes to remain till the end of October while the Bishop is away.

It being important that he, as being in charge of the Diocese, should reside in Rangoon, the Rev. G. H. Seeley has been transferred to Maymyo some six months earlier than would have been the case, and the Archdeacon has taken his place in charge of Rangoon Cantonments.

Two Indian regiments containing Christian companies have been stationed in Burma, and a clergyman from India, Rev. H. Dhan Singh, was sent with them to minister to the Christians.

But in February, the one with most Christians was sent to the Front, so that Mr. Dhan Singh's stay was cut short.

On December 26th, Mr. James Ferguson, B.A., Royal University, Ireland, Principal of the Diocesan Boys' School, was married to Miss Kathleen Gladys Wall, a fully qualified doctor, holding a medical appointment under Government in addition to private practice. She is L.R.C.P. and L.R.C.S. of Edinburgh, and also F.R.C.S. and L.M. of Dublin.

We congratulate them, and wish them all happiness.

IN MEMORIAM.

It is with great regret that we announce that Lieut. H. M. Blakeston was killed in action in Mesopotamia on March 25th, aged 25. He was the only son of the late Rev. L. H. Blakeston, Vicar of Womersley, near Doncaster. He was educated at the King's School, Pontefract, and Rossal, and took his B.A. degree at Cambridge Selwyn College, in August, 1913. In October of that year he went out to Burma to Mandalay where for one term he had charge of the Royal School. He was then transferred to the Diocesan Boys' School at Rangoon. It was his intention to prepare for Ordination, and to work abroad for some years.

In August 1915, he received his commission and went to India for training, and then to Mesopotamia for active service.

His death will be a great loss to the teaching power of the Diocese.

We desire to express the sympathy of our members with his mother and sister.

REPORT

for the year ending December 31st, 1916.

Once more we thank God that the part which our Association has to play at the home base of this Holy Warfare for Christ in Burma has been sustained during another year—a year of European, and indeed almost world-wide war.

There are no signs that the prayers of our Association and the spiritual forces which prayer sets free have been diminished. Those forces indeed human powers cannot fully estimate, yet even in our necessarily brief report they must not be passed by in silence.

The Staff of the Diocese.

From the home church the Revds. A. O. N. Lee and C. W. Lyne have gone out each for work under the B.A.C.S. Mr. Lee has undertaken the important and new charge of ministering to the large body of English who are engaged in the Wolfram works near Tavoy.

Miss Sellwood has filled the gap caused by the illhealth of Mrs. Chard who was compelled most reluctantly to give up her work in the Bishop Strachan Home for Orphan Girls. Miss Slocombe from the Ladies' College, Guernsey, re-inforces the staff of the Diocesan Girls' School. Mr. Messer has joined Mr. Kinch at the new Eurasian Boys' School at Moulmein where now are three English Schoolmasters, living together as a Brotherhood.

The staff of the diocese has lost Archdeacon Cory by retirement, and Mr. J. S. M. Ward through illhealth, while four more of the clergy are serving the troops in Mesopotamia—we hope not for long.

The staff of the Karen clergy has been strengthened by the ordination to the diaconate of the Revds. Maw Re and Maw Sha Po, and the Tamil staff by that of the Revd. V. G. Gnanaprakasan. Thus there are now eighteen clergy of Eastern birth—one more than the English clergy attached to the S.P.G. May the former continue to outnumber the latter.

Finances.

The total of the receipts raised by the Association is £993. Of this £245 was given to the special appeal for a motor launch for the mission work in the Delta. We could wish that the ordinary and regular support had been maintained, for if we omit this special fund, the total (£748) falls below that of 1915 (£854) and of 1914 (£918) considerably.

A new and encouraging feature has been the gift of two sums £1000 and £25 for investment on behalf of the work in Burma. The money has been made a Trust Fund of S.P.G., and the interest each year will appear in our accounts. The smaller sum is in place of an Annual Subscription, which it will supply *in perpetuity*.

The present year will, we fear, prove one of much difficulty. Let us remember that the terrible war does but reveal our need of more and more faithful christianity. The Church in England and in Europe will never have vitality to meet her home needs and combat home evils until by sacrifice and obedience her powers are strengthened. We gain by giving. Moreover, the war has taught us how much more we can endure and give than we thought possible three years ago.

So let none cease their prayers and devotion. "It is not what a nation gains, it is what a nation gives that makes it great" the Prime Minister has said—having learnt the truth from our Lord. It is writ large in S. Mark x. "Whosoever would become great among you shall be your minister." "For verily the Son of Man came to minister and to give."

May we be true to the faith during this present year, and then the church in Burma will not lack support.

HOME NOTES.
