

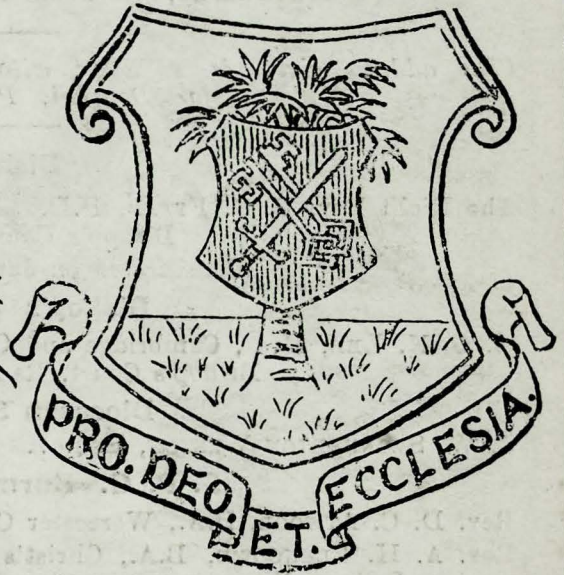

NEWS FROM THE FRONT.

The Bishop with Mrs. Fyffe and Lawrence, arrived about the end of October. Since then he has been to Port Blair and Car Nicobar, Moulmein, Mandalay, Maymyo and Toungoo.

No letter has arrived from the Bishop for this number, but from letters to Bishop Knight we gather that the European Boys' Schools are in danger of collapse for want of English masters, and probably S. Matthew's School, Moulmein, will have to be closed, and the boys transferred to Rangoon.

The Rev. J. G. Lister and family got back at the end of November; also the Rev. N. K. Anderson, who has been appointed to Shwebo with Bhamo. The Rev. H. M. Stockings has had to provide for these two stations for some time.

The Rev. V. N. Kemp and Mrs. Kemp got back in time for Christmas at S. Gabriel's. At the same time there arrived Miss Fairclough who sets Miss Burnett free for furlough from S. Matthew's School, Moulmein; Miss Selby, for S. John's European School, Toungoo, releasing Miss Crichton; also two new ladies, Miss Burn for the Diocesan High School for Girls, in place of Miss Slocombe who has left and Miss Rawson, who will do medical and evangelistic work in the Delta.

All the Diocese will mourn the loss of Rev. A. O. N. Lee from his place at Bishops court. It is rather more than two years since he took over charge of the Bishop's Office from Mr. Hardcastle. Since then he has been in touch in one way or another with every one working for the Church in the Diocese and with our supporters both in Burma and England. We believe that all would agree that he has proved himself a prompt and efficient man of business and had also endeared himself to all with whom he has had to do. He leaves the complicated accounts and business in perfect order and hands on a high tradition of what is required of the Bishop's Chaplain. With the Chaplaincy to the Bishop he has also held charge of the Chaplaincy of Insein with additional charge of Tavoy and Mergui—to such straits are we reduced by the shortage of Clergy. He left for a well earned rest by the steamer that brought the Bishop back. We hope to see him back before long as a Government Chaplain.

Diocesan Magazine.

The Rev. T. Fisher has relinquished charge of the Oilfields and Riverine Chaplaincy, and has taken Mr. Lee's place as Chaplain of Insein with charge of Pegu, Tavoy, and Mergui.

The Rev. E. W. Blyth, of the Karen Mission, was married to Miss Crichton, who has been working at S. John's School, Toungoo, at Christmas. We wish them rich blessing in their married life.

CONFERENCE AT S. MICHAEL'S KEMMENDINE.

This annual gathering of Burmese Karen and Chin Christians with their Clergy, catechists and teachers, was very successful and pleasant. As the Bishop was away there could be no Confirmations, so the muster was for a shorter time, from the Monday before Michaelmas to the day after, giving three clear days for worship and counsel.

There were about 300 visitors. On Michaelmas Eve, they were entertained at S. John's College, and an interesting and useful talk on "Civics" was given by Mr. Baretto.

The whole of Michaelmas Day was spent in the Cathedral, and about 400 native Christians were entertained to breakfast, tiffin and dinner by the Cathedral congregation, and all were delighted and gratified at the reception given them by their European brethren.

At the morning meeting, Mr. Furnival, a Government Commissioner, gave a helpful address on "How to make the most of village life," and also answered many questions about government administration.

In the evening, a miracle play entitled "The Conversion of S. Paul," was given by the blind boys.

It was their own composition, and thoroughly native in style of acting and singing.

One result of the Conference was that a Kemmendine Native Pastorate Endowment Fund has been established on a system analogous to the one at Toungoo and the Diocesan Board of Missions has accepted the office of trustee and is giving help.

Another is that a Burmese Editor—Maung Po San, a teacher in S. John's College—has undertaken to edit the Burmese Mission Newspaper in place of Rev. F. R. Edmonds, who has resigned.

The Government allowance for A.C.S. Chaplains has been raised from Rs. 150 to Rs. 200 a month. The Additional Clergy Board is raising its share from 300 to 400 Rs.

The Indian National agitation has spread to Burma, and there is a boycott of Government and aided schools on account of the University Act. Mr. Blencowe found it advisable to close S. John's College temporarily to prevent it closing itself. We hope matters will soon right themselves.

COMBINED SALE FOR MISSIONS OVERSEAS.

For the first day of the Sale the weather was perfect, and the attendance was the largest we have had at anytime except in the Pan Anglican Conference year. But the second day was quite different, and the attendance very small. However, £1,228 was taken by the twenty-three Societies represented, ranging from £104 for Chekiang Diocese, China, to £26 for Kwangsi Hunan Diocese, China.

The Winchester Mission Stall took £42, the R.D.A. Stall £33. We are very grateful to the ladies who looked after the stalls, all who helped to furnish them, and all the purchasers.

For the first time for several years the extra receipts did not cover expenses and each stall was called on to pay 15/-.

IN MEMORIAM.

THE BISHOP OF GIBRALTAR.

We desire to express our deep sympathy with Bishop and Miss Knight in the loss of their brother, Henry Joseph Corbett Knight, who, from the consecration of Bishop A. M. Knight to the See of Rangoon in February, 1903 until May, 1910, acted as Commissary. He was then principal of the Clergy Training School at Cambridge, and was able to secure a good many splendid Cambridge men for the Diocese.

It was he and Mrs. Knight who introduced and kept up the social element of our Annual Meeting which makes it so agreeable a gathering. Our Association owes to him a great debt of gratitude for his wise guidance as Chairman of our Committee during the seven years of his service and for his combined interest and help since. R.I.P.

THOMAS WILSON WINDLEY.

One of the earliest workers in the Karen Mission passed to his rest on November 9th. Mr. Windley was ordained in 1873, in the Diocese of London, and in 1875 went out to Burma to succeed Rev. C. Warren in the care of the new work at Toungoo among the Karens, and laboured faithfully till ill health caused him to resign in 1882.

On his return home he worked in the Southwell Diocese, Thorpe by Ashbourne, All Saints, Nottingham, and All Saints, Weston, till he retired in 1913. Except that from 1898 to 1902, he was S.P.G. Organizing Secretary for Southwark Diocese. R.I.P.

On November 26th, a party started from Liverpool by the *Anamapoorā*—Rev. C. R. Garrad, Rev. and Mrs. V. N. Kemp, Rev. T. W. Hogarth, Misses Selby, Fairclough, Burn, Rawson.

The Rev. T. W. Hogarth, L.Th. Durham, was ordained in 1915, to the curacy of Thornhill Lees in the Diocese of Wakefield, and moved to Horbury in 1916 and to King Cross, Halifax, in 1918. Miss Burn, daughter of the Dean of Salisbury, is to replace Miss Slocombe at the Diocesan Girl's High School.

Miss Rawson will take Miss Dunkley's place at Kemmendine. She will be supported by S. Andrew's, Ashley Garden's Missionary Union. She has had a term at the Bermondsey Medical Mission.

Mr. J. W. Swinnerton-Weston started on January 7th, by the *Burma*. He will take up the work of Diocesan and Bishop's Secretary, and is going out at his own charges.

ORDINATIONS.

Messrs. G. H. Hughes and G. A. West were ordained at Durham for work in Burma, on Sunday, December 19th. They sailed on January 20th.

Cecil Kendrick Hughes was Jodrell Scholar of Queen's College, Oxford, and also obtained the Squire Scholarship. He took a second class in Classical Moderations, and obtained distinction in the examination for the Oxford Diploma of Theology. He served in the War for two years with the 6th Dorsets in General Plumer's Army in Flanders, and was in actual fighting six weeks before the Armistice, after a long spell in the trenches.

George Algernon West was a History Exhibitioner at Lincoln College, Oxford. He, too, served in the War, and returned to take his degree.

Both were boys at school together at S. Bee's.

A few special slides of Mandalay were shown, two groups of which included Miss Patch, who went out from that parish. There was a large muster of children—K.M. Members and others, and a good many adults. The Rev. C. H. M. Fasson, Priest-in-charge, opened and closed.

On November 4th, Mr. Cooke was at S. John's, Bethnal Green. At 6.30, there was an audience of about 350 children who were very attentive and orderly, and at 8.30, a good muster of adults. The Rev. S. B. Welch, Vicar, presided, and also worked the electric lantern.

The next evening, 5th, the Lectures were at S. Clement's, Ilford. At 6.0, a room nearly full of children, in spite of the attractions of fireworks, and at 8.0, a good gathering of adults. Both audiences were very interested. The Rev. W. H. Jackson worked in this parish until a few months before he went out, and now Miss Hurden has gone out from it. Three children in the Blind School are supported and other help to Mr. Jackson in his work is given.

Members and others, and a good many adults. The Rev. C. H. M. Fasson, Priest-in-charge, opened and closed.

On November 4th, Mr. Cooke was at S. John's, Bethnal Green. At 6.30, there was an audience of about 350 children who were very attentive and orderly, and at 8.30, a good muster of adults. The Rev. S. B. Welch, Vicar, presided, and also worked the electric lantern.

The next evening, 5th, the Lectures were at S. Clement's, Ilford. At 6.0, a room nearly full of children, in spite of the attractions of fireworks, and at 8.0, a good gathering of adults. Both audiences were very interested. The Rev. W. H. Jackson worked in this parish until a few months before he went out, and now Miss Hurden has gone out from it. Three children in the Blind School are supported and other help to Mr. Jackson in his work is given.

The Rev. A. W. Ottaway, Vicar, presided at the first meeting, and the Rev. R. L. Moore, Chairman of the Missionary Committee, at the second.

DURHAM DIOCESE.

Winston Branch.—On Sunday, January 9th, the Rev. C. Kendrick Hughes preached on behalf of the Association, morning and evening in the Parish Church, and in the afternoon in Newsham Hall Private Chapel, when the offerings were devoted to the work among the Karens. On Thursday, 13th, a Public Meeting was held in the Parish Room, under the Presidency of the Rector, the Rev. P. Hughes. Addresses on their prospective work in the Diocese of Rangoon were given by Mr. Hughes, jun. and his colleague, the Rev. G. A. West. A large

number of the villagers attended to hear about the country and the work to be done, and the impressive words of the two young men went home to the hearts of those present. Many offers to take Collecting Boxes were made and the prospect of good support was most encouraging. The meeting was also a farewell gathering, and the Recruits were commended in earnest prayer to the grace of God and His Almighty care. They were greatly encouraged and their ready response to the Call of the far East was thoroughly appreciated.

ELY DIOCESE.

The General Secretary had a pleasant tour in North Cambs., October 18th to 23rd, taking with him all the necessary paraphernalia for the lantern lectures.

On 18th, he was at Manea. The Vicar, Rev. Jary, presided over the room full of interested listeners. £1 6s. was collected, and given to R.D.A., without any deduction for expenses.

On 19th, the lecture was in the Church Room of S. Peter, Wisbech. In spite of it being a full week with a great Fruit Show, a good number came, and proved an appreciative audience. £1 2s. 6d. was given for R.D.A. The Rev. W. T. R. Crookham, Vicar and Rural Dean, presided.

The next evening, Mr. Cooke was at Leverington. Here the audience was small, but all who came thoroughly enjoyed the lecture. Proceeds 5/-.

The Thursday engagement had been cancelled owing to the illness of the Vicar ; but on Friday 22nd, there was a large gathering in the Church, at Tydd S. Giles. The Rev. G. Woodgate, Vicar, took the opening and closing services. 13/6 was given to R.D.A.

On Monday, 25th, Mr. Cooke lectured at S. Luke's, Chesterton. There were about 120 children and thirty adults. The Rev. W. W. Partridge, Vicar, presided, and there was a splendid lantern. After deducting expenses, £1 2s. 1d. remained for R.D.A.

LONDON DIOCESE.

The Rev. C. W. Lyne gave a Lantern Lecture on November 25th, at S. Peter's, Hornsey. There was a large audience including many Scouts and Wolf Cubs, for whose benefit some slides of the 1st Moulmein Scouts were shown. Collection 15/-.

On December 18th, Mr. Lyne repeated this lecture at S. Anne's, Highgate, and received £2 1s. 6d. for R.D.A. The Missionary Association here support two Scholars in Burma.

A Sale of Work was held in the Parish Room, Hayes, on December 4th, and proved very successful.

PETERBOROUGH DIOCESE.

North Kilworth.

On Thursday, January 13th, a Missionary Pageant was given in the Village Hall, North Kilworth, in aid of R.D.A. Funds. There were two parts to the programme. The first was entitled "Round the World in Native Costume," over twenty members of the Kilworth King's Messengers taking part, wearing costumes from many countries of the world and singing verses descriptive of the countries represented, and their various missionary needs.

The second part was entitled "Scenes from Village Life in Burma." The stage was arranged to represent the centre of a Burmese Village with Pagoda Monastery, with bazaar stall and Burmese house. The scenes opened with the Buddhist Monk going his begging round after which there followed the monastic school the boys being taught in Pali (for the Buddhist religious formulae) and Burmese, alphabet and numerals. These followed various other scenes depicting village life—carrying water, pounding rice, rolling cheroots, etc., after which came the Pagoda Festival offerings of flowers and lighted candles being made at the Pagoda, followed by an exhibition of Burmese Dancing.

The day closed with the evening meal, and a very realistic retirement to bed in Burmese style by one of the performers. Twenty-one performers took part in the Burmese scenes, and and the whole programme was much appreciated.

A sum of £3 10s. 6d. was realised for R.D.A.

S. ALBANS DIOCESE.

On November 3rd, the General Secretary gave a short address at the Communicants' Intercession Service in S. Andrew's Church, Earlsfield, and then a Lantern Lecture in the Hall. The Rev. G. Tudor Craig, Vicar, presided, and his two colleagues were present. The audience followed the lecture with close attention. The collection for R.D.A. was £1 3s. 6d.

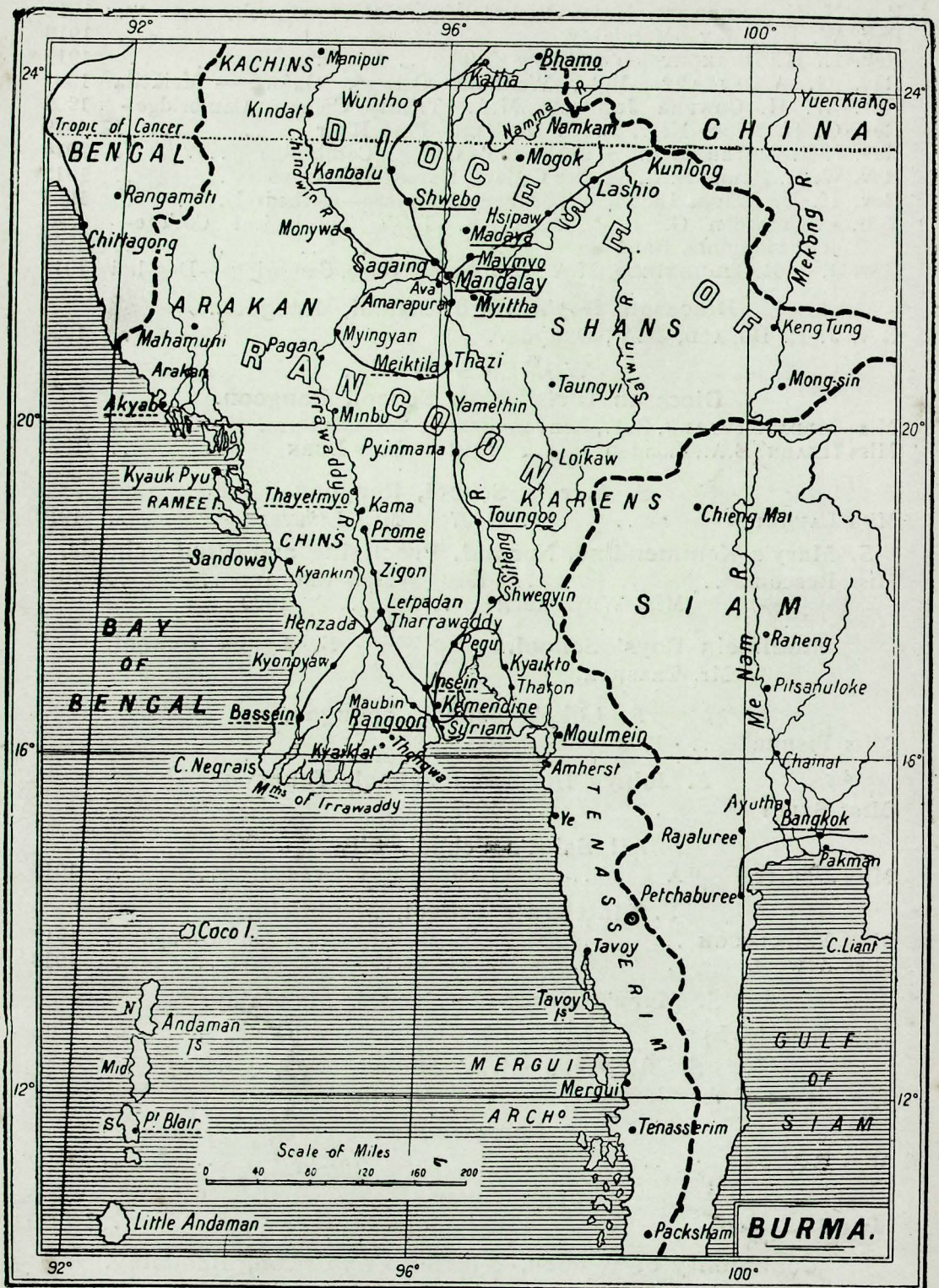
